Entry requirements

In order to meet the general entry requirements for first cycle studies you must have successfully completed upper secondary education and documented skills in English language and Approved course MUA 270 Basic course music 10 p or MUA421. At uncertainty of prerequisite level, or if selection for other reasons is necessary, a special test could be used.

Selection

The selection is based on 1-165 credits.

Course Aim

To give the student artistic ability of expression by giving a good basic skill in the techniques and other knowledge necessary for instrumentation of smaller ensembles. At the end of the course every participant must have presented at least five instrumentations for smaller ensembles.

Contents

Basic instrument knowledge of the most common groups string, wood wind and brass instruments regarding range, dynamic characteristics, transposition etc. The participants write instrumentations of piano pieces for string orchestra, wind quintet and brass quintet. Difficulties and suggestions of solutions for transposition of piano music to other kinds of ensembles are being dealt with.

Realization

Each course occasion's language and form is stated and appear on the course page on Luleå University of Technology's website.

Number of participants: Maximum 10, minimum 2. The studies are pursued alternating in seminars with the whole group and with a small group of two. This in order to have a possibility at whole-group occasions to examine and discuss subjects and in that case give the participants a chance to communicate to each other different knowledge and experiences. This also gives an opportunity to train giving and receiving criticism, to stand up for a point of view, and to make a self-evaluation. At the two-group occasions it is possible for teacher and student to penetrate more in detail the specific problems and questions arisen at the solution of the instrumentation tasks.

Examination

If there is a decision on special educational support, in accordance with the Guideline Student's rights and obligations at Luleå University of Technology, an adapted or alternative form of examination can be provided. At the two-group occasions every student will present a completed instrumentation task in noted form. At some occasions a sounding example could be necessary. This will be discussed by the teacher and the student. For approved course it is also demanded active participation at seminars. The assessment of the tasks will be done by the examiner/teacher.

Remarks
